

# General Types of Virtual Meetings









Individual/Small Group

Very common

 Usually require a constituent to initiate Chapter Meeting

Becoming much more common

 Recommend one point of contact from chapter doing outreach Townhall

Can be phone or zoom

 Growing in prevalence Pre-recorded

 Some legislators will send a pre-recorded message

 Staff person may be present







### **Authorization vs Appropriation**

### **Authorization**


• "Authorizations" are done by Congress via legislation that "can establish, continue, or modify an agency, program, or activity for a fixed or indefinite period of time," per the Congressional Research Service.

### **Appropriation**

• "Appropriations" are done by Congress via legislation that authorizes agencies to make payments from the federal Treasury (i.e. it allows them to spend the money that had previously been authorized). 12 individual appropriations bills are supposed to be passed each year.



- Generally this is how most state legislatures work as well
- Overriding a Governor's veto can vary by state rules
- State Bills move much faster than federal bills





# The 5 Step Federal Budget Process



1.

The President submits a **budget** request to Congress.





2.

Lawmakers release their own budget plans and set overall spending levels with a budget resolution.



3.

House and Senate subcommittees set funding for each program through appropriations bills.



4.

House and Senate members come together to resolve differences in their appropriations bills.



5.

The budget returns to the President for his signature before it **becomes law**.
